Verry shares with **DyNAMC** readers that the sport of football taught him and how to discipline overcome obstacles. It taught him that anything that he stays focused on, he can overcome and achieve.

"It wasn't necessarily the sport that taught me the significant things that turned me into the man I am today. It was more the people I encountered along the way. Verry shared, "I wish I could describe how much Aldrica impacted my life in my younger years and how much she exposed my eyes to and keeps me relevant to the things I'm watching nowadays. He honors those people because they've all since passed away. Verry tells **DyNAMC** readers. "Those are the ones who, although they aren't here, when things get hard; I remember their encouraging words and their faces. And I know that I can overcome anything."

An extremely motivated young man, Verry's future goals are to impact his community in multiple positive ways. He hopes to make it to the next level infootball and be able to share his experiences as a person who came significantly at a perfect time; and still does from tough neighborhoods but was able to "overcome adversity with just a bunch of love and dedication and just really not giving up."

> "That's really what I want to give back to the community," Verry says. "If you believe in yourself and you focus on what you want in life and not give up, you can make it far from there to your destination."


> As a college student and a college athlete, Verry still finds time to give back. He currently coaches a Pop Warner little league team and plans to return to his community to uplift and share what he's learned.

the sports arena. "Growing up," he said, "if you looked around, you'd see people of different races and ethnicities struggling. When I moved outside of my community I saw things that I hadn't seen in the inner city. It channeled my creative mind and inspired me to do things that I didn't think were possible. So diversity at a young age is extremely important. It's a necessity really, because if I didn't spark my mind at a young age, I think it would have been too late."

Unfortunately, Verry has encountered discrimination both on and off the field. Verry shares that because he wasn't exposed to the same influences that some were privileged to have, they sometimes "put you off to the side."

"Where I grew up, you are forced to be a man at an early age. Verry explains that being a man meant having the attitude that "no one can stop you." Verry's first team experiences were challenging because of this attitude but he soon overcame it. "You're not used to playing as a team, and if you have that attitude of 'no one can stop me, give me the opportunity, give me this, give me that,' because they look

at you and think, 'he just wants to be in the spotlight. He doesn't get it." As a result, when he joined a more prestigious football program, it took time to adjust to his personality. "Things changed for the better when I fell into THEIR program. Thinking back, it did something to my confidence. I thought, 'What am I doing wrong?' But then I realized that you have to create opportunities with your effort, your hard work, and dedication; and that's basically what I had to do. I had to create an opportunity and learn from the experience."

Verry is indeed fortunate to have had some very inspirational people enter his life who have supported him in his endeavors, and he has certainly let none of his opportunities go to waste.

Verry has been featured in DyNAMC Leaders for a Changing World magazine and is considered one of its most prized "Future Leaders." He has developed high personal standards, and committed ideas about contributing to his community and to the world, as a whole. Based on his achievements so far, we think he'll do it!
